Commencement Speaker

Jonathan Madson was born in Tacoma, Washington,

one of nine children born to Juul and Clarice Madson.

After attending high school in Mankato, Minnesota, he enrolled at Bethany Lutheran College, graduating in 1976 with an associate in arts degree. He received a bachelor of science degree in health education from Minnesota State University, Mankato in 1978. He taught grades 7-8 at Holy Cross Lutheran School in Madison, Wisconsin, from 1979-1981. In 1981, he returned to Mankato and began studying for the pastoral ministry, receiving his master of divinity from Bethany Lutheran Theological Seminary in 1986.

Madson served as an associate pastor at Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Madison, Wisconsin, from 1986-1989. In 1989, he accepted a call from the Home Mission Board of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod (ELS) to do exploratory mission work in Kissimmee, Florida. A congregation was established in Kissimmee and was served by Madson until 2000. He then accepted a call to serve as the pastor at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Okauchee, Wisconsin, a position he held from 2000-2018. He returned to Florida and served as the pastor at New Life Lutheran Church in Sebring from 2018-2024. He retired from the pastoral ministry at the end of July 2024.

Madson served for many years on the ELS Board for Education and Youth and is currently a member of the ELS Board of Trustees. For several years, he served as the circuit visitor for Southeast Wisconsin ELS congregations during his years in Okauchee.

Madson married Sharen (née Larson) in May 1987 in Madison, Wisconsin. The Lord has blessed them with two children, Nathan (BLC 2020) and Chloe (BLC 2025). Sharen and Jonathan and both retired and currently reside in Vero Beach, Florida.

Bethany Lutheran College

In 1911, Bethany Ladies College opened with forty-four students and four faculty members, and a mission to educate young women. In 1927, the Norwegian Synod, later known as the Evangelical Lutheran Synod (ELS), purchased the college. The ELS operated the school as a co-educational high school and junior college until 1969, when the high school department was closed. Bethany Lutheran Theological Seminary began in 1946 as a department of the college; in 1975 it became a separate institution.

In May 1996, the Board of Regents resolved to start moving Bethany from an associate to a baccalaureate degree-granting institution. In the spring of 2001, Bethany entered a new era in its history by granting its first baccalaureate degrees. Bethany continued with academic program growth by offering its first master of arts program in 2021.

Academic Regalia and Ceremony

The academic procession is led by the chair of the faculty assembly carrying the college mace, followed by the college president, the chaplain, the vice president of academic affairs, and a member of the Board of Regents. The faculty marshal leads the rest of the procession. The emeriti lead the faculty, who march in order of seniority, and the graduates follow the faculty. Banners are carried by junior marshals and represent the various academic divisions of the College.

Regalia

Graduates and faculty members wear ceremonial regalia that conform to traditions and practices of the academy. The bachelor's graduates are wearing black gowns with an open pointed sleeve. Ceremony participants with advanced or terminal degrees wear gowns that represent their earned degree. Master's graduates wear a gown with an oblong sleeve, open at the wrist. The oblong shape is square cut in the back, the front section tailored with an arc cut. Those who have earned a doctorate wear a gown distinguished by velvet trim on the front facings and three stripes on the sleeves. This trim may be black or may have color identifying the individual's major field of academic achievement.

Ceremonial regalia also includes academic hoods. The size and cut of the academic hood indicates the level and type of degree an individual holds. The lining of the hood, in Bethany's case red and white, indicates the school colors and the outer velvet trim indicates the bachelor's degree. As with the bachelor's hood, the master's and doctor's hoods have the same color designations in the lining of the school where the degree was earned and velvet trim indicating the field in which the degree is held.

College Mace

The College mace was designed and carved by Eric Ouren. The mace is a symbol of power or authority. Its origins can be traced to early medieval times when it was literally an instrument of power as a war club. It eventually evolved into the ceremonial scepter of monarchs. For colleges and universities it symbolizes the authority to grant degrees given to the faculty by the state or church.



Presidential Medallion

The presidential medallion worn today by President Gene Pfeifer was created in 2001 for the first ceremony at Bethany with bachelor's graduates. The college president wears the medallion at commencement, opening service, and other times when academic apparel is appropriate. The medallion is hand tooled, cast in oxidized bronze and hand polished. The presidential medallion hangs on a bronze chain individually



listing the past presidents of the college on a small metal banner. The current president's banner is in the center above the medallion, and is separated from those of past presidents by leaf clusters. The seal of Bethany Lutheran College is engraved on the front side of the medallion.

College Seal

The College seal was made official by a resolution of the Board of Regents in 1932. The idea of the college seal originated with Ruth Seidel, who was an instructor at Bethany, and her artist brother, Wilbur Seidel of Chicago, who furnished the detailed drawing.



The seal is distinctive and most appropriate. The inscription "ENOS ESTIN XPEIA" is Greek and means "One Thing Is Needful," the words of Christ spoken to Martha at that first Bethany. The "One Thing Needful" is the Gospel of the crucified Savior, expressed by the cross upon which the inscription is placed. For Bethany Lutheran College we thereby declare that there is no true education, even as there is no salvation, without the Gospel of Christ, Son of God and Savior of the world from sin. That Gospel is, and must remain, the heart and soul of every educational effort at our beloved institution. The cross is encircled by a star with twelve points, upon which are shown rays of light extending from the cross. As the twelve apostles were commissioned to be bearers of the light from the cross, so the goal of our training at Bethany must not be our own advancement, but the spread of the Gospel.

Core Values

COMMITMENT TO THE GOSPEL – Because God's Son, Jesus Christ, has lived perfectly in our place and paid for all sins, God declares all people to be innocent in His sight, an innocence received by faith. Bethany therefore proclaims this Good News to students that they may believe, and grow in faith and in the knowledge of Jesus as their sure hope for eternal life.

FOCUS ON THE STUDENT – The College places the spiritual, intellectual, physical, social, and emotional needs of the student first in all decisions, policies, and procedures.

Statement of Faith

Bethany Lutheran College is a Christian liberal arts college. The College and the Evangelical Lutheran Synod are committed to the teachings of the Bible as the inerrant Word of God – the only authority for faith and life. The statements of faith known as the Lutheran Confessions are accepted as the correct understanding of the teachings of the Bible.

This commitment to the Confessions is summarized by the principles of the Lutheran Reformation: Grace Alone, Faith Alone, and Scripture Alone. Specifically, the College confesses that salvation is a free gift from God's grace alone, not dependent upon our works. We receive forgiveness for our sins through faith in Christ alone, which is produced in the individual's heart by the Holy Spirit through the Word of God and the Sacraments. Scripture alone is the standard by which all teachings and practices ultimately are evaluated.
